


Self-advocacy guide







What is self-advocacy?



People with Down
syndrome often have a
limited voice in the
decisions that affect them.



Self-advocacy is speaking up for yourself and other people with Down syndrome or disabilities.



You have the right to make your own choices.



Self-advocacy groups



A self-advocacy group is a place where people with Down syndrome meet and engage in advocacy work together.



Self-advocacy groups share feelings and experiences and they support each other.



Self-advocacy groups work on projects together.



Join a self-advocacy group




You have the right to be fully included in society.
